This is the second year that our 7th graders have gone to visit St. John's. The entire 7th grade went on this trip and there were seven busloads of students!

The students took a tour of the campus and got to see the main buildings (library, dining hall, student center, arena & academic buildings). This year our tours were extra special because they were led by Hauppauge graduates who now attend St. John's! The students also attended a St. John's University Women's Basketball game in the Carnesecca Arena and a couple of our alumni tour guides joined them for the game. All students got to visit the campus bookstore.



Dr. Carolyn Probst, Assistant to the Superintendent for Educational Services and Student Outcomes is working to help create a college-going culture here at Hauppauge Schools by scheduling "College Awareness" trips beginning in Middle School or earlier. Dr. Probst said, "The trip to St. John's is very exciting because it serves as a great kickoff to our early college awareness efforts. Our goal for this trip is to spark students' excitement about college opportunities. For many young students, college seems distant and abstract. Visiting a campus and taking in an NCAA Division I sporting event are experiences that make the concept of college much more real."

Why did you want to become a teacher?

To work with children and help them learn and grow.

Where did you go to college?

I graduated University of Mary Washington in Fredericksburg, VA.

What did you like about college?

I liked the independence, exploration, new friends and college life.

What is the best part of your job? Playing a part in student growth.

How long have you been teaching? Since 1990....you do the math!

Do you have any traditions or superstitions regarding the first day of school? Everyone has first-day jitters so I like to share funny read aloud books on the first day of school. Students also enjoy activities that incorporate movement and learning about their new classmates.

What makes a good day at school for you?

A great day is when I see students take risks and grow.

What accomplishment fills you with pride so far this year?

I have completed a good amount of professional development recently so I'm pleased that I got it done.

How does technology make teaching more simple or difficult?

Technology can be very engaging and enjoyable for students. It can make math more fun if that is even possible!

If you could sit in on another teachers class for a day, who would it be and why?

I am very fortunate because I've been in Hauppauge for a good amount of time and I've worked in two of the three elementary buildings. The push-in portion of my program gives me the opportunity to visit classrooms. I am always impressed with the dynamic teaching I see and I always learn from my colleagues. # THE HUMAN-ANIMAL BOND IS A WONDERFUL THING AS "THERAPY DOGS" VISIT HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

The Hauppauge High School Social Awareness Club recently invited students to stop down at their latest event. They welcomed back the therapy dogs! Colleen Ruffini and Shannon Griffin, High School Social Workers, are the club's advisors. Ms. Ruffini said, "We bring the therapy dogs in for a visit twice a year before mid-term and final exams. The purpose of the visit is to help students and staff reduce their anxiety during some particularly stressful times of the school year. We brought in the therapy dogs for the first time last year in January and they were a HUGE hit with both students and staff. That's why we brought them back this past June and will continue this program for the future. We've received a lot of positive feedback on its benefits."

The therapy dogs are provided by PRAAT (Patchogue Rotary Assisted Animal Therapy). This is a community service project of the Patchogue Rotary Club. PRAAT was founded by veterinarian Dr. Roy Hensen with the belief in the therapeutic potential of dogs.

PRAAT screens, trains and evaluates all dog-handler teams (the volunteer and their dog). Upon successful completion





of the PRAAT dog-handler team training, teams become eligible to make visits at over 150 of their contracted and insured facilities across Long Island. With over 75 active dog-handler teams, a minimum of 120 pet therapy visits are provided each month. Their vision statement is "A world where all peoples lives are enhanced through the power of the human-animal bond."


The dogs that came to today's visit are Molly and Cory. Molly belongs to Harvey and Janet Gerstel. Molly started out with training as a guide dog, but transitioned over instead to be a therapy dog. Molly remains the Guide Dog Ambassador for the Guide Dog Foundation. Mr. Gerstel and his wife attend approximately 100 events each year with Molly, between the Guide Dog Foundation and PRAAT. They enjoy attending this Hauppauge event especially because they have a granddaughter in the high school.

Cory attended today with Bill from PRAAT. Cory has a wonderful temperment and enjoyed all of the affection from the students who came to see him.

The Social Awareness/SADD club is two-fold. First, Social Awareness is about addressing issues that affect our students. These could include school-wide, community, national or international issues. Ms. Ruffini said, "We seek to educate our students about issues and hold events to make an impact on them." SADD (Students Against Destructive Decisions) is closely related and gets involved in events or campaigns to help encourage our students to make healthy choices socially, behaviorally and emotionally. Ms. Ruffini said, "The students have a big say in what issues they would like the club to tackle."

Some events that Ms. Ruffini said the club has run include the following:

- Collaboration with Smithtown Youth Bureau on a few events such as 'Parents are the Key', which is a driving-safety campaign for teens as well as putting together a PSA on the negative consequences of vaping.
- Red Ribbon Campaign: The club has partnered with MADD to encourage students not to drive while under the influence or get into a car with a driver under the influence. They sign a pledge and receive a red ribbon. They have also displayed the red ribbons along Lincoln Blvd with signs explaining the campaign during the month of December.
- Participation in fundraising walks such as 'Walk Like MADD' (to support MADD) and 'March for Babies' (to support the March of Dimes foundation)
- During Safe Halloween, the club does a Teal Pumpkin project to educate the community on food allergies for children. They also provide non-candy alternatives for activities and prizes at the event.



Ms. Ruffini also said that the club makes and displays signs around the school with positive mental health messages.

The staff and students were enthralled with this visit by the therapy dogs! Mrs. Ruffini said, "We can't wait to have them come back for another visit!"

# HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS EARN THEIR WAY INTO "RHO KAPPA" THE NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY FOR SOCIAL STUDIES

Last night, Hauppauge High School inducted their first group of students into Rho Kappa. Rho Kappa is the National Honor Society for Social Studies. These students not only had excellent grades in social studies and on the Global History and Geography Regents but, they also exhibited community service.

Doreen Gordon, Director of Social Studies and Business, and Ellen Robbins, high school Social Studies teacher, are the advisors for Rho Kappa. Eligible students have earned minimum grades of 87 in AP World History I and II or 92 in Global History I and II and achieved mastery on the NYS Global History and Geography Regents.

The name Rho Kappa symbolizes the belief that knowledge without service is useless. The basic principles of Rho Kappa include:

<u>Truth</u> - The idea of truth which is untarnished by prejudice or bias. It is the search that leads to greater understanding of the world and humanities place in it.

<u>Knowledge</u> - You have the distinction of being one who seeks knowledge in your youth and you are, therefore, building upon your understanding of the past in order to create a future of your own and that of the world in which we live.

Wisdom - It is the tool we use to discern what is true and how to value that truth.


Service - True civic engagement in school or community service lies not within what you do but why you do it.

# FOREST BROOK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL INCORPORATES A UNIQUE LEARNING TOOL


Forest Brook Elementary School recently incorporated a very unique learning tool in their building. This is their new sensory path!
