#### "TEACHER SPOTLIGHT"

Brian Ferrara STEM/Mathematics Middle School



Why did you want to become a teacher?

To make an impact. Growing up I could remember the name of almost every teacher I had - especially the ones that influenced me or helped me grow in some way. I wanted the opportunity to do the same.

Where did you go to college? Yale University

What did you like about college?

My favorite part of college was the freedom to choose a variety of classes that interested me. I was also fortunate to attend one of the most beautiful campuses in the world and met my wife there, so those were certainly added bonuses.

What is the best part of your job?

Seeing the students be creative when presented with a challenge and witnessing their ideas become reality.

How long have you been teaching?

Seven years. This is my 4th year at Hauppauge.

Do you have any traditions or superstitions regarding the first day of school?

It's not really a superstition, but every year I create a new program for the robots to welcome students to my class.

What makes a good day at school for you?

A good day for me is when I walk around my room and all students are fully engaged and working together to create interesting programs. It's also always a good day when there are no issues with the robots or technology.

What accomplishment fills you with pride so far this year?

Creating and implementing the Coding 6 curriculum using kidOYO.

How does technology make teaching more simple or difficult?

Since much of my day involves technology, I can see how it can make teaching both more simple and more difficult. A modern classroom environment featuring robots, coding, and computers does help increase engagement while preparing students for a digital world and possible careers in the STEM field. At the same time, implementing new technology can be tricky and, at times frustrating (especially when it wants to malfunction at inopportune moments and the fix isn't easy or

obvious). In the end, I do enjoy the challenge of figuring out how things work, especially when doing so can help the class run more smoothly and feel like the rewards of technology far outweigh the frustrations for both myself and the students in the classroom that get the added benefit.

If you could sit in on another teachers class for a day, who would it be and why?

I've been fortunate enough to sit in on many great classes taught here at Hauppauge Middle School, including those taught by Mr. Florence, Ms. Brophy, Mr. Boyle, and many others. One class I have not yet had a chance to witness in person that I would like to see is Ms. Bach's ELA class. I know many students consider her class their favorite, and since we both have a common interest in Marvel Comics, I'd love to see a lesson where she threads that topic in to increase student interest.

Is there a piece of wisdom you would pass on to your students?

Everyone has a bad day - what matters is how you react to that adversity.

If you could take your students on a field trip anywhere in the world, where would it be? Google Headquarters.

What is one of your best memories of being a student?

I had a science teacher in High School named Mr. Abrams who was one of the friendliest, smartest, most interesting people I have ever met. Any memory from his class could be considered one of my best, but if I had to pick one it would be the day we got to make our own bang snaps. I don't know why, but it just stands out as a fun day that my friends and I still laugh about.

Do you have a favorite thing about your classroom?

Rock, Mario, and Zelda - the 3 NAO robots (and the computers to program them). They set my room apart from just about any other classroom.

What advice would you give to new teachers?

Be flexible, be prepared, and be yourself.

What would students be surprised to find out about you?

I was a practicing attorney for 5 years before changing careers.

What word would describe you best when you were a student? Well-rounded.





# STUDENTS ATTEND "ALS RIDE FOR LIFE ASSEMBLY" AND LEARN "GEHRIG GRIT"

Bretton Woods Elementary School held a very important and moving assembly for their students in grades 3-5 on Monday. It was the "ALS Ride for Life Assembly." The assembly was about teaching students about ALS, but more importantly it was about teaching students how to overcome adversity in their own lives and never give up.

Chris Pendergast visited the students. He has been living with ALS which stands for Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, for many years. ALS is a neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord that control voluntary movement. Mr. Pendergast was an elementary school teacher who now is unable to move his limbs and speaks with an eyegaze computer called a Dynavox. The Dynavox works by track-





ing eye movements on to a keyboard and generating speech. Former educator, Mr. Dick Iannuzzi, helped co-present along with another ALS patient, Mr. Nelson Colon.

During the assembly, Mr. Pendergast showed the students how his computer and chair works. He even had students manipulate his chair to move him across the room! Chris's message of hope and overcoming adversity has made an impact on many people. He encourages everyone to have "Gehrig Grit" which he says is, "Never give up, always have hope, and remain optimistic no matter what the odds are."

"ALS Ride For Life" has raised over 8 million dollars! The money goes towards research, grants for those who have a confirmed medical diagnosis of ALS, legal services related to ALS, loaner power wheelchairs, scholarships for New York state high school seniors who have had a family member with ALS, and more.

Teacher, Tara Dungate said, "I have been in contact with the organization and they are going to try their best to have Bretton Woods be one of their stops along their ride in May!" Forest Brook has participated for the past five years and is a stop on the "ALS Ride for Life." They held an assembly as well last week.

Bretton Woods held a "Jeans Day" fundraiser on Friday. They are gratful for everyone's support of this worthwhile cause.




