"TEACHER SPOTLIGHT"

Rosellen Enrico
Grade 4
Pines Elementary School



Why did you want to become a teacher?

For as long as I can remember I always wanted to be a teacher. There were no teachers in my family, but I always had a desire to work with children and have my own classroom.

Where did you go to college?

I went to Long Island University, LIU Post – Brookville Campus.

What did you like about college?

I loved the beautiful LIU campus in Brookville and spending spring days with friends on the Great Lawn. In addition, the education department was small so I really got to know the professors and the other students. I decided to complete my Masters in Reading at LIU-Post as well.

What is the best part of your job?

The best part of my job is building relationships with my students. I truly enjoy being with them each day and getting to know them. Every year is new and so rewarding. It keeps me young...I look forward to coming to work everyday!

How long have you been teaching?

I have been teaching for 28 years – 12 years in Kindergarten, 9 years in 1st grade, 5 years in 3rd grade and the last 2 years in 4th.

Fourth grade has been my favorite. The curriculum is interesting and the students are so independent and curious to learn new things.

Do you have any traditions or superstitions regarding the first day of school?

Well, I still get the night before jitters, so I just relax and try to get to bed early.

What makes a good day at school for you?

A good day at school for me means a student had that "ah ha" moment while learning something new and/or I was able to help a colleague with something.

What accomplishment fills you with pride so far this year?

The accomplishment that fills me with pride this year is the start of my crocheting club. I learned how to crochet by going to classes and watching videos. I really love it because it relaxes me. I felt it would be great to teach the 4th and 5th graders how to do it. The club was a hit and the members enjoyed making new friends and chatting. Any way we can teach our students to relax and focus on something other than technology and schoolwork is a good thing!

How does technology make teaching more simple or difficult?

I teach 4th grade where the iPads are in the classroom to enhance learning. I believe the technology allows me to diversify my teaching and give opportunities for my students that I would not have without technology. It's great to be able to screen share a child's work up on the board and have others comment on it or push out a cool virtual field trip about a topic on Nearpod. I also love

that there is a wealth of resources for me to use and share with my students and I can do it from anywhere. I don't know how I taught for years without it!

If you could sit in on another teachers class for a day, who would it be and why?

I would love to sit in on Mrs. Wray-Dolgin's chorus rehearsals. I always said I would love to come back as a music teacher. To be honest, I have forever wanted to be on Broadway, so singing and teaching would be the next best thing for me!

Is there a piece of wisdom you would pass on to your students?

I would tell my students to follow your passion and never give up on your dreams.

If you could take your students on a field trip anywhere in the world, where would it be?

I would love to take my students to the Statue of Liberty. I hadn't been there until I brought my own children 2 years ago and I think everyone should see it.

What is one of your best memories of being a student?

When I think back to my education, the memories that pop into my head are the incredible teachers I had and the special relationships, activities and events that I participated in. For example, the 3rd grade play, my 6th grade graduation where I read a speech, the Gong Show, being in the plays in elementary and middle school, homecomings, competition nights, cheerleading competitions, being on student government, etc. I think with that being said, as a student, students should get involved in school events. These people and events created friendships and memories that last forever.

Do you have a favorite thing about your classroom?

My favorite thing about my classroom is the view!!! I am currently on the second floor at the Pines and enjoy looking over the tops of the "Pine" trees! I call it the tower. I also like that my class represents my students. I love having their work and projects up so they can see their accomplishments.

What advice would you give to new teachers?

I think the best advice I would give to new teachers is, show compassion for your students. Be flexible and try to understand where they are coming from. It's important to realize that you will not be everyone's favorite teacher, but if you show them that you "get" them, they are more apt to cooperate and show you respect. Not every child can sit flat in a chair or sit still for 40 minutes. Be reasonable and offer choices.

What would students be surprised to find out about you?

I think they would be surprised to know that I have students that I taught kindergarten who are now 33 years old and have children of their own!

What word would describe you best when you were a student? I was definitely a perfectionist.

Do you have any favorite books you would recommend to students to read?

The Bridge to Terabithia by Katherine Paterson is my all time favorite book. I actually read it in a graduate course.

Why did you choose Hauppauge Schools?

Gratefully, Hauppauge chose me! In January, 1991 I was working as a teaching assistant in the reading department in Cold Spring Harbor when I found out about a part time teaching position at Hauppauge. When they heard I was already working with Title 1 students, they hired me as a part-time teacher at the Middle School. I felt like I won the lottery! That was the start of my career in Hauppauge.



OUR SCHOOLS HAD THEIR "IRISH" ON FOR ST. PATRICK'S DAY CELEBRATIONS







MIDDLE SCHOOL LIBRARY OFFERS SECTION "BOOKS IN OTHER LANGUAGES" FOR ENL READERS

Mrs. Katsiotas encouraged the non-ENL students to take a look at the new section. She said, "It's kind of cool to hold a book





Congratulations to our students on this honor of playing at this impressive concert series!










DR. HORAN HAS ARTICLE PUBLISHED
