
"Tacky Tourist Day"



"Exploration Day" was held at Hauppauge Middle School today. Seventh grade students were led by members of the Hauppauge High School History Club and their advisor, Mrs. Robbins, through a variety of stations that included: StarLab from the Cradle of Aviation Museum, Reasons for Exploration, Columbian Exchange, Mariners' Quadrants, Exploration in the Virtual World, Scientific Exploration, Oregon Trail, and Artifacts from a Sunken Ship's Hull. Teachers, History Club students and Mrs. Gordon, Director of Social Studies and Business, created the remaining stations. The students were able to explore in the Virtual World through the use of nearpod and their iPads, experience the Oregon Trail with chrome books and see how to navigate with the stars.

"Exploration Day" was a wonderful program and experience! It was thoroughly enjoyed by our students!

















HIGH SCHOOL SOCIAL STUDIES STUDENTS HOST A SPECIAL GUEST


On Thursday, October 18th, students in 12th grade "Participation and Government" classes were treated to a visit from Suffolk County Legislator, Tom Cilmi. Legislator Cilmi serves for the Tenth Legislative District of New York and was first inaugurated in January 2010.

The 10th District in Suffolk County is located primarily in the Town of Islip, with a small section in the Town of Brookhaven. The District encompasses Islip, East Islip, Hauppauge, Islip Terrace, Great River, Bohemia, Ronkonkoma, parts of Bay Shore and Islandia.

Legislator Cilmi spoke to the seniors in Mrs. Stebbins', Mrs. Robbins' and Mr. Druckenmiller's classes about the path that brought him to serve the people. He talked about the responsibilities of the Suffolk County Legislature and the need for active citizens. The visit was arranged by Hauppauge High School Social Studies teacher Mrs. Stebbins.

Mr. Cilmi spoke to three classes of seniors encouraging all to become involved in their community and exercise their civic responsibilities. Students asked questions about his job, laws, and the greatest problems facing Suffolk county.

BRETTON WOODS TEACHER, VERONICA WEEKS, ACCEPTED INTO SUNY MASTER TEACHER PROGRAM

Bretton Woods Principal, George Gagliardi, announced on Monday, October 15th, that Bretton Woods teacher, Veronica Weeks, has been accepted into the SUNY Master Teacher Program. Mr. Gagliardi said in an email to staff, "Please join me in recognizing and congratulating Veronica Weeks. Veronica was accepted into The SUNY Master Teacher Program. This program is for K-12 teachers of STEM. Governor Cuomo opened the program up to elementary teachers in 2018. Veronica will be with the first cohort of elementary teachers accepted. It is a four year commitment and will constitute a minimum of 50 professional development hours each year. Veronica has an orientation meeting and dinner at Stony Brook University on Thursday, November 1st. We wish her the best of luck!"

As stated on the SUNY website regarding this program, Governor Andrew Cuomo launched the New York State Master Teacher Program (NYSMTP) in partnership with the State University of New York and Math for America. He did this in response to a call to strengthen our nation's K-12 STEM education. The NYSMTP celebrates the work of the highest-performing STEM teachers by establishing an expert community



dedicated to developing expertise in the areas of content, pedagogy and students' families and communities. Inspiring our state's best teachers and rewarding their efforts ultimately attracts talented students into careers in STEM fields, including STEM education. Through participation in the NYSMTP, selected STEM teachers receive \$15,000 stipends annually over four years.

Ms. Weeks is a 5th grade teacher at Bretton Woods and co-teaches with Ms. Tara Dungate. She said, "I am absolutely thrilled to be a part of this cohort. I have my orientation and dinner on November 1st at Stony Brook University. I was so excited that I already started signing up for professional development through the program and will be presenting with other Master Teachers on October 16th at the Islip Middle School about the horseshoe crab project through Molloy College. I look forward to working with other teachers that share my passion for STEM."

It turns out that Mr. Henriksen graduated from Hauppauge High School in 1966. His children went through





the Hauppauge Schools and his grandchildren currently attend Forest Brook Elementary. They are Taela and Alex Carros.
