

During the week of August 12th, the High School Marching Band spent a full week honing their skills at Marching Band Camp. Under the direction of Band Teacher, Andrew Monsen, these musicians, as well as the Color Guard and Kickline, worked hard to get their music on point and their moves down pat. From the looks of it, the band is doing great and it proves to be an awesome season for them!



While everyone on the field played music and maneuvered though their routines, Mr. Monsen sat atop the bleachers in the press box and got an aerial view of the action. With microphone in hand, he guided the students in helping them fine-tune their routines.




"TALKING TO COMPUTERS" IS WHAT OUR CODING STUDENTS ARE LEARNING, AND DOING

The world of coding is like a mystery to those of us who didn't grow up in this new world of technology that surrounds us today. But, coding is definitely not a mystery to our students and they are embracing the offerings that our District is supplying and the list is only going to grow from here.

First, what is coding? The definition of coding is "A precise set of instructions a computer can understand." Basically, all lines of code will tell a computer what to do. A document full of lines of code is called a script and each script is designed to carry out a job. Computers speak different languages; Python, C++, Perl and Visual Basic are just a few. Coding is basic literacy in the digital age and it is important for students to be able to work with it and understand the technology that is around them. Having children learn coding, even at a young age, prepares them for the future.

Coding has been deemed a helpful tool to students with other areas of their learning. It helps with communication, creativity, math, writing and lastly confidence. Coding is also a great prerequisite if a student wants to continue into a career in the world of technology. Some jobs that are available to a technology student are Software Application Developer, Web Developer Computer Systems Application Developer, among



Developer, Computer Systems Engineer, Computer Systems Analyst, among many others.

Frank Hufnagel is a teacher at the high school. He has taught Web Design for 17 years. Last year was his first time teaching Python. Among courses in marketing and business, Mr. Hufnagel teaches Coding classes. His classes include HTML CSS Web Development (1/2 year), Python (1/2 year), and Coding 2 which is all Python and in which students learn game design. Students can start these classes in 9th grade and they are prerequisites for the IB Computer Science Course which is taught by Briana Becker and Dennis Petercsak. Mr. Hufnagel said that before he started teaching coding classes, students would enter IB Computer Science with no coding skills and they had to be taught them in that class. Mr. Hufnagel also teaches a summer bridge class for students who are entering IB Computer Science in the Fall.


Mr. Hufnagel said that Python is primarily a popular coding language and that YouTube is written with Python. The final project in his Coding 2 class on game design is to design a "brick breaker" game. The students also work on text-based games, 20 question games and the beginnings of AI (artificial intelligence).

High school students also work on obtaining "badges." These are proof of a skill that is acquired in coding. After a student graduates high school, they will have been able to have built a portfolio showing proof of what they have done and the skills they have learned. When a student completes or solves a challenge, they earn a badge. Mr. Hufnagel said that colleges and employers are now using badges as credentials.

Mr. Hufnagel shared that on the first day of school, he shows his coding students a YouTube video that he finds important. It is titled "Coding is Easy and Why You Should Learn Coding." The video features Bill Gates, Mark Zuckerberg and other successful people who all started with coding. Click here to view this inspiring and informative video.


