





An Important Message from Dr. Dennis P. O'Hara, Superintendent of Schools

Dear Hauppauge Families:

On behalf of the Board of Education and myself, I am reaching out to you to provide information regarding the coronavirus (COVID-19) and the preparations we have in place in the Hauppauge School District.

Our primary focus is the health, safety and well being of our students, faculty, staff and community. We have been closely monitoring information from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Although, as of the writing of this letter, there are no confirmed cases of COVID-19 in New York or Long Island, we have protocols and processes in place designed to protect our community.

All guidance indicates normal cleaning procedures are the proper course of action and effective; however, to be proactive, and in preparation for a potential outbreak on Long Island we have done the following:

- Invited health officials from Northwell Health to present to our principals, school nurses, Director of Pupil Personnel Services and Support Services, Director of Facilities, Director of Security and me
- Principals and school nurses participated in a webinar provided by the NYS Department of Health
- Met with head custodians to review cleaning protocols and to establish enhanced and more intense practices in the case of an outbreak
- Contacted an industrial-grade cleaning agency to be prepared if a quick and all-inclusive, district-wide cleaning/disinfection becomes necessary
- Ordered fogging machines, which are expected to arrive by Monday, and will be used in evenings to disinfect large meeting areas
- Principals will review with all faculty members the signs and symptoms of the flu and COVID-19

Out of an abundance of caution, procedures have been in place or will begin Monday as follows:

- Classrooms desks, doorknobs and other surfaces are cleaned on a schedule in the evenings with a product known as Virex
 - ⁻ This product has been in use in the District for approximately 12 years
 - Virex is a one-step disinfectant that kills microorganisms including HIV-1, VRE, MRSA, GRSA, MRSE, VISA, PRSP, Herpes Simplex 1 & 2, Influenza Type A2, Adenovirus, Rotavirus and many more
 - We are advised Virex also kills COVID-19
- Custodians will be wiping down desks, doorknobs, bathroom faucets, and stairwell handrails with Virex multiple times throughout the day
 - This protocol will go into effect the moment a case is confirmed on Long Island
- Cafeteria tables are cleaned following each lunch period
 - Virex will be used in the cafeterias when ample drying time is available
- Additional wall dispensers will be installed in cafeterias so that students can disinfect their hands before and after eating (wall dispensers are already in each cafeteria, but more are being added to allow better access and encourage students to use them)
- Bottles of hand sanitizer will be provided for every classroom in the middle school and high school so that students can sanitize their hands upon entering and exiting classrooms (dispensers are already present in every elementary classroom)
- Teachers will be asking students to sanitize their hands upon entering and exiting classrooms
- Teachers will, to the extent possible, increase space between individuals in the classroom
- Principals and staff will make regular announcements reminding students and staff of everyday preventative measures

- Nurses will immediately quarantine any student or employee who appears symptomatic upon arrival to school
- Any person, students or adults, appearing symptomatic will be immediately required to wear a surgical mask and will be sent home (students will remain in the nurse's office until safe and proper conveyance is con firmed)

As in the case of other communicable diseases, with the flu or COVID-19, regular and everyday preventive actions and precautions are effective. Please practice and remind your children of the following:

- Avoid close contact with people whenever possible, especially those who may be sick
 - Close contact is defined as within six feet for more than ten minutes
- Stay home when you are sick
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve when coughing or sneezing
- Use tissues only one time and then discard in an appropriate receptacle
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth
- Clean cell phones with disinfectant wipes as often as possible
- Wash hands frequently
 - Before, during and after preparing food
 - Before eating food or snacks
 - After using the restroom
 - Before and after caring for someone who is ill
 - After changing diapers or cleaning a child who has used the restroom
 - After blowing your nose, sneezing or coughing
 - After touching an animal, animal feed or animal waste
 - After handling pet food, pet treats, or pet waste
 - After touching garbage
- If you or your child exhibit symptoms of COVID-19 or the flu, see a medical professional immediately
 - Symptoms may include fever, chills, cough, runny nose, shortness of breath, headache, sore throat, sinus or ear pain, abdominal pain

Washing with soap and water is the best way to reduce the number of germs on your hands. When washing hands do the following:

- Wet hands with clean running water and apply soap
 - If soap is not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60% alcohol (please be reminded we are making hand sanitizers available in every classroom)
- Lather your hands by rubbing them together with the soap. Lather the backs of your hands, between your fingers and under your nails
- Scrub for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song from beginning to end twice
- Rinse well under clean, running water
- Dry your hands using a clean towel or air dry them

As there are no cases in New York State at this time, the risk to residents and students is low. Thus, we have no plans to close school or cancel events. However, we continue to closely monitor communications from our local and state departments of health, as well as the CDC. We will be in touch with families and the community if the situation changes. As always, please contact me any time with your questions, concerns and insights.

MIDDLE SCHOOL "STUDENTS UNITED CLUB" CELEBRATES BLACK HISTORY MONTH



HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR IS NAMED NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP FINALIST

High School Senior, Sophie Epstein, has been named a 2020 National Merit Scholarship Finalist. The finalists were notified on February 3rd after a Certificate of Merit was mailed to High School Principal, Chris Cook.

Initiated in 1955, the National Merit Scholarship Program is conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC), a not-for-profit organization that operates without government assistance. In each annual National Merit Scholarship Program, about 50,000 academically talented high school students are honored, but only 16,000 of them are named semi-finalists based on the Preliminary SAT/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test and they are the only participants who have an opportunity to advance to the Finalist level and compete for National Merit Scholarships. About 7,600 of the outstanding Finalists will be chosen as Merit Scholarship winners in the 2020 competition.

All Merit Scholar designees are chosen based on their abilities, accomplishments, and potential for success in rigorous college studies-without regard to gender, race, ethnic origin, religious preference or family financial circumstances.

In March of 2020, Sophie will find out if she has won a National Merit Scholarship. We wish Sophie the best in obtaining a National Merit Scholarship and look forward to hearing if she is a winner!

HAUPPAUGE TEACHERS TRAIN AT GOOGLE






"WIRE SCULPTURES IN MOTION" IN HIGH SCHOOL SCULPTURE CLASS

Congratulations to our youngest learners! We wish them well on the rest of their school year!















HIGH SCHOOL CODERS COMPETE IN FIRST-EVER "HACKATHON"








HIGH SCHOOL SCULPTURE CLASS ENJOYS SPECIAL VISITOR

Dr. Horan recently taught an art class for Ms. Mc-Grath's Sculpture course. The students were starting a unit on woodcarving, so Ms. McGrath invited Dr. Horan into her classroom to talk about his craft, and to show some of his woodcarvings. When asked about his art experience, Dr. Horan said, "My training in art is mostly in drawing and painting. However, I just knew intuitively how to carve wood, so I didn't have to learn it. I love exploring other countries and their cultures and history, and this often shows up in my art. I'm Irish, so the first thing I carved was the Celtic cross. With no training and no practice, I just sat down and did it. It took me about a week. It's all original, so there's nothing else quite like it in the world. If you look at it closely and interpret it carefully, it tells the story of Christianity coming to Ireland (complete with a panel from the Book of Kells). But you have to read this carving from the ground up!"



After carving the Celtic cross, Dr. Horan continued on to say, "I carved a large Star of David for the professor who mentored me on my doctoral thesis. She was very devoted to her Jewish heritage. In the center space, I carved the word 'Shalom' (Peace) in Hebrew letters. At the conclusion of my dissertation, I presented it to her as a gift, and told her I intended it as a blessing on her house. It's the only piece of art I have given away, and I wish I took a picture of it! I'm planning on duplicating it from memory. Next, I carved the Egyptian cartouche. This is a copy of something found in King Tut's tomb. Essentially, it reads 'Tut-Ankh-Amun [Living Image of Amun], Ruler of Heliopolis in Egypt.' It's sort of like a royal coat of arms that protects the bearer's soul in life and after death. The other carving is a Japanese hanging scroll. It reads 'Nichinichi kore kojitsu.' It's a Zen Buddhist proverb that basically means 'Every day is a good day.' I say this to myself every morning when the alarm clock goes off. It reminds me that every day is special, and must be treated as a gift."

Ms. McGrath and Dr. Horan are currently collaborating on future lessons in her classroom, all focusing on the world of art.
