I have seen what Nicolas and other kids go through on my visits to the hospital. It makes me feel so sad that there is no cure for cancer. I wish children did not have to suffer this way."

Gianna asked for help from the Bretton Woods school community by sending home a heart with her letter. Families were asked to decorate the heart, write their name on it and return it with \$1.00 (or more if possible). Happily, \$1,200 was collected to go towards this great cause!

The collected hearts were hung near the main office to show that at Bretton Woods, they have "Hearts of Gold!" All donations are going to the Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center to fund and research a cure.

### PINES STUDENTS DONATE THEIR COINS, NOT JUST TO MAKE A DONATION, BUT TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Four years ago a wonderful tradition began at the Pines Elementary School called "Coins for a Cause." Inspired by coins generously donated by Pines students at the Fall Book Fair to buy books for the school library, Pines Book Fair Chairperson and current Vice President, Lisa Catanzaro, thought it would be interesting to see what coins could

be collected on a larger scale. With a motto borrowed from Ghandi "Be the Change you wish to see in the world," Mrs. Catanzaro challenged each class to donate a different coin each day for one week: Monday - pennies, Tuesday - nickels, Wednesday - dimes, Thursday - quarters, Friday - any coin. All students in the winning class in each grade received a \$1 coupon to be used at the Fall Book Fair. Also, each student in the winning class was given 10 raffle tickets for a chance to win a special mystery box filled with books and other fun items.



The first year of the "Coins for a Cause" challenge, students and staff donated over \$3500 with which the Pines PTA purchased gift certificates, toys, books, blankets, diapers and other items needed by the children at Stony Brook Hospital. The second and third annual "Coins for a Cause" challenge raised approximately \$3800 and \$2700. Due to many recent natural disasters occurring in places such as Puerto Rico and Texas, the Pines PTA chose to donate all of the money collected to the National PTA



Disaster Relief Fund. The Disaster Relief Fund was established to respond to tragedies that disrupt school and education systems and to provide support to schools and communities to ensure they have the resources needed to restore normalcy in times of hardship.

The donations collected from this year's "Coins for a Cause" challenge will also be donated to the National PTA Disaster Relief Fund. In just one week, Monday September 23rd - Friday, September 27th, over \$4100 was collected by Pines students and staff! Each day, coins were taken to a coin counting machine and tallied by the PTA for each class. These totals were later reported

to the main office to be announced during the afternoon announcements. The daily anticipation and excite-

ment was felt by all awaiting the news of who the leading classes were in each grade! Cheers were heard throughout the halls as the daily leaders were announced.

The Pines PTA couldn't be more proud of the generosity and compassion shown to those less fortunate. Many children and schools will benefit from the kindness shown by the students at Pines Elementary!
