








Congratulations to the winner and to all of our students for their hard work taking such careful guesses. Special thanks to the Gries family for their pumpkin donation every year!


OUR HAUPPAUGE EAGLES HAVE FLOWN FROM THEIR NEST AND ARE SOARING IN THE REAL WORLD

THE "FIGHT THE SUMMER SLIDE CHALLENGE" IS A BIG SUCCESS FOR OUR STUDENTS
















MATHSPACE


INSTITUTE OF CREATIVE PROBLEM SOLVING FOR GIFTED AND TALENTED STUDENTS ACCEPTS HAUPPAUGE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT

The Institute of Creative Problem Solving for Gifted and Talented Students at SUNY College at Old Westbury is proud to announce that our Freshman High School student, Viraaj Hegde, was accepted by them. Viraaj is among 85 students who will pursue the study of mathematics and its applications.

They said, "To qualify for this honor, the 85 students we selected for the Institute's three divisions competed against approximately 550 of the top-ranking students recommended by educators from public and private schools on Long Island. Selection by the Institute implies that a student is among the top one-tenth of one percent in math of all students on Long Island in his or her grade. Acceptances were based on four criteria: school transcript, teacher recommendation, a brief statement written by the student and a rigorous entrance exam."

Each student will now spend 50 hours in class over the course of 20 Saturday mornings. The curriculum covers mathematical topics from algebra, geometry, discrete math and number theory, in addition to topics not included in the standard courses of study. These topics include problem solving applied to probability, theory of finite differences, science applications and mass point geometry.

Parents were able to join in on the fun and be a part of this wonderful, and very sweet, event!








MIDDLE SCHOOL LIBRARY CELEBRATES "COMIC-CON"


