### HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR, EMMA VASILAKOPOULOS, IS ANNOUNCED AS NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP SEMIFINALIST

High School Senior, Emma Vasilakopoulos, has been selected this year as a National Merit Scholarship Semifinalist!

Officials of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation announced on Wednesday, September 9th, the names of approximately 16,000 Semifinalists in the 66th annual National Merit Scholarship program. These academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,600 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$30 million that will be offered next spring.

As explained in the September 9th announcement, "To be considered for a Merit Scholarship award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the Finalist level of the competition. Over 90 percent of the Semifinalists are expected to attain Finalist standing,



and more than half of the Finalists will win a National merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar title."

Over 1.5 million juniors in about 21,000 high schools entered the 2021 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2019 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state. The number of Semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors.

To become a Finalist, the Semifinalist and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about the Semifinalist's academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment and honors and awards received. They must also have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, and write an essay. Semifinalists that advance to the Finalist level will be notified of this designation in February.

National Merit Scholarship winners of 2021 will be announced in four nationwide news releases beginning in April and concluding in July. These scholarship recipients will join more than 353,000 other distinguished young people who have earned the Merit Scholar title.

Emma has made the most of her time in school activities. She has been in orchestra since elementary school and in every play since entering high school. Emma is currently the president of the Hauppauge Orchestra and is the Treasurer of Model U.N. and received a "Best Delegate" award.

Emma is a full IB diploma candidate who has taken and excelled in the most rigorous courses from the day she entered high school. Emma also received several medals at the regional Science Olympiad competition that Hauppauge hosted this past year and was supposed to be on the team that travelled to the State level, but it was cancelled due to COVID-19.

Emma is not yet sure where she will attend college. She is thinking of studying political science and ultimately going on to Law School.



# HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR, VINCENT GERARDI, IS NAMED A "LONG ISLAND SCHOLAR ARTIST"



# MIDDLE SCHOOL STAFF WORKS TO PUT STUDENT SAFETY FIRST WHILE BUILDING IN A SOCIAL CONNECTION

Christine O'Connor is the Principal of Hauppauge Middle School. Recently, she spoke at a Board of Education meeting and talked about how they are handling student safety while building in a social connection for their students during the return to school during this COVID crisis.

Mrs. O'Connor mentioned that the District Staff recently had a Superintendent's Conference Day speaker from the "Jesse Lewis Choose Love Movement," Scarlett Lewis. She founded this movement after her son Jesse was murdered during the Sandy Hook Elementary School tragedy in December 2012. At six years old, Jesse, alongside 19 first-grade classmates, died. Yet, law enforcement says Jesse used his final moments to heroically save nine of his



friends. Shortly after his death, Scarlett decided to be part of the solution to the issues that we are seeing in our society today. She created the "Choose Love Movement" and became an advocate for character development and social and emotional learning which teaches children how to manage their emotions, feel connected and have healthy relationships.

Mrs. O'Connor said, "One of the things the speaker said was 'Physically distanced, but socially connected.' This is one of the things we are committed to that is very important this year. How we can make sure the students are physically distanced, but still socially connected?"

Mrs. O'Connor spoke about how teachers are working on ways of connecting the kids in the class-room with the kids learning from home. She said, "When we look at the curriculum, teachers can design lessons where the students are fully engaged and using technology. They don't need to pull their desks together, but they use technology instead to connect. We are looking at things with new eyes."

Mrs. O'Connor said the biggest challenge they face in the Middle School is people and space. There is no large space, but they have three large areas. She said she is working with personnel to get more subs and more people to accommodate groups. They are getting teachers comfortable with more mask breaks. Mrs. O'Connor said that during double period classes, there is a perfect opportunity on nice days to take classes outside for fresh air.

With regard to lunch, Mrs. O'Connor said, "At lunch our students can be outside if they sit stationary and six to eight feet apart. If they do this, they are able to take their masks off. We had asked for towels on the school supply list so students could sit comfortably outside on the ground. We have to look for these opportunities to make it enjoyable." Mrs. O'Connor also said they are working with their teams on providing appropriate movies in a space for students, as well as a quiet time space and maybe something else they can do during another time in another space.

We are happy to see our middle school students adjusting and doing well. We will keep you upto-date on these students, and all the students in our District schools each week. Thank you, Mrs. O'Connor and Mr. Caulin, for the wonderful job you do in the middle school!






#### VARSITY GIRLS CROSS COUNTRY TEAM HASN'T STOPPED RUNNING YET

























