HAUPPAUGE HIGH SCHOOL STAFF AND STUDENTS ARE DEMONSTRATING THAT "TEAMWORK MAKES THE DREAM WORK"

Hauppauge High School recently began its 2020-2021 school year. While a unique year, the HHS Team is excited by the energy in the building. Students and staff are settling into routines and new expectations, and our teaching time is working to deliver high-end instruction to every single student. All the while, safety remains their number one priority.

High School Principal, Chris Cook, recently spoke at a Board of Education meeting and reported to the Board on the high school reopening. He said, "We worked on reopening over the summer and the preparation was unlike anything I have ever seen. Staff had no hesitation and were happy to do anything that was asked of them." Further, Mr. Cook has added, "teachers are thinking carefully about their instruction, balancing so many things, and still they are supporting our students' development as young people."

With regard to students wearing masks for much





of the day, Mr. Cook said, "the high school has 1,000 students in five different environments each day. All mask breaks take place outside of the classroom, but under teacher supervision. During a 70 minute block, there is some independent time and teachers are able to take their students on a mask break outside of the classroom. They are also taking their students on outdoor mask break walks... an extension of instructional time."


In addition, lunch has achieved a new normal. Students first sit in their assigned rooms before being called to line up and stand on blue dots while waiting to get to the lunch window. Once students have their lunch, gone are the usual lunch tables and students sit at individual desks that are spaced six feet apart. During A & D days, the cafeteria accommodates 200 students per each of the four lunch periods, while on B & C Days, 1,000 students will eat their lunch throughout the building during third. During virtually all lunch periods, students have the chance to go outside, have a mask break and enjoy the courtyard or in other supervised locations.

The revamped high school courtyard has become a vital area for the students. Mr. Cook explained that the courtyard has been a relaxing and enjoyable place. His office now looks onto the courtyard, and he has enjoyed seeing so many students utilizing the peaceful space. The school is also looking into purchasing tents for the courtyard, so students can still go outside when it is raining. While in the courtyard, students are able to spread out into small groups, physically distanced, and enjoy some fresh air outdoors.

With regard to opening the building, Mr. Cook said, "When we opened the building, there were logistical snags here and there, but everyone was as prepared as possible. The students are coming to school and responding by doing every little thing we are asking of them. They have an understanding that we are doing something really excellent and spectacular." As we turn into our fifth week, students in school and at home are thriving. Teachers and the broader team continue to work to support our students in any way possible.

Thank you to the HS Team, the assistant principals Joy Ferrara, Joseph Wieckhorst and Kristy Pagliari, along with the entire HS operation team! The team of custodians, security, and buildings and grounds members has also supported the high school at every turn. The technology enhancements have been monumental. Also, thank you to the hard-working teachers and support staff, and our Directors for their leadership in curriculum and instruction. The contributions every team member makes each day are evident, as the high school is running smooth.

same website. All proceeds will go directly to Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center to fund and research a cure for pediatric cancer."




Gianna concluded her letter saying, "Please join me in this wonderful cause. Together, we CAN make a difference!"















