





WE REMEMBER ALS CHAMPION AND SCHOOL VISITOR, CHRIS PENDERGAST

Forest Brook Elementary School has treasured being a stop on the ALS "Ride for Life" for the past six years. The "Ride for Life" was founded by Chris Pendergast, a former Northport teacher who lived in Miller Place. Mr. Pendergast was diagnosed with ALS in 1993 and although he was given three years to live, he survived living with the disease for 28 years. He defied the odds and helped to raise awareness and money for those with the disease. Forest Brook became a designated stop for Mr. Pendargast and other ALS patients as they rode their electric wheelchairs down the highways and local streets from Greenport to Washington Square Park in New Yor City each year.

Forest Brook Principal, Kristen Reingold, shared the following regarding their yearly visits from Mr. Pendergast, "Forest Brook was blessed to welcome Chris Pendergast and the "Ride for Life" crew to our school for the past six years. Mr. P. is the true definition of a hero. He lived his life to encourage others to always have hope and to persevere in the face of any obstacle. His courage was inspiring and his impact on our world is immeasurable. It is a privilege and honor to have known Mr. P. The staff and students at Forest Brook Elementary School extend our deepest sympathies to his family and friends."





STUDENTS ATTEND "ALS RIDE FOR LIFE ASSEMBLY" AND LEARN "GEHRIG GRIT"

Bretton Woods Elementary School held a very important and moving assembly for their students in grades 3-5 on Monday. It was the "ALS Ride for Life Assembly." The assembly was about teaching students about ALS, but more importantly teaching students how to overcome adversity in their own lives and never give up.

Chris Pendergast visited the students. He has been living with ALS which stands for Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, for many years. ALS is a neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord that control voluntary movement. Mr. Pendergast was an elementary school teacher who now is unable to move his limbs and speaks with an eyegaze computer called a Dynavox. The Dynavox works by track-





ing eye movements on to a keyboard and generating speech. Former educator, Mr. Dick Iannuzzi, helped co-present along with another ALS patient, Mr. Nelson Colon.

During the assembly, Mr. Pendergast showed the students how his computer and chair works. He even had students manipulate his chair to move him across the room! Chris's message of hope and overcoming adversity has made an impact on many people. He encourages everyone to have "Gehrig Grit" which he says is, "Never give up, always have hope, and remain optimistic no matter what the odds are."

"ALS Ride For Life" has raised over 8 million dollars! The money goes towards research, grants for those who have a confirmed medical diagnosis of ALS, legal services related to ALS, loaner power wheelchairs, scholarships for New York state high school seniors who have had a family member with ALS, and more.

Teacher, Tara Dungate said, "I have been in contact with the organization and they are going to try their best to have Bretton Woods be one of their stops along their ride in May!" Forest Brook has participated for the past five years and is a stop on the "ALS Ride for Life." They held an assembly as well last week.

Bretton Woods held a "Jeans Day" fundraiser on Friday. They are grateful for everyone's support of this worthwhile cause.





Teacher, Tara Dungate commented today, 10/16/20, that in speaking to her students in class about Mr. Pendergast, they remembered his visit and his message, "Never lose hope." "Stay positive." "Help others." She said he was an inspiration to the staff and students at Bretton Woods and he truly lived his life by the message that he used in his program.

Bretton Woods participated in the 2020 "Ride for Life" by making posters for the ride.


BRETTON WOODS P.T.A. MAKES A SPECIAL DONATION
