## HAUPPAUGE-SMITHTOWN GIRLS' VARSITY SWIMMING AND DIVING TEAM CAPTURES 4TH CONSECUTIVE LEAGUE 1 CHAMPIONSHIP!

Congratulations to the Hauppauge-Smithtown girls' varsity swimming & diving team. On Wednesday, October 25th, they captured their 4th consecutive League 1 Championship!

The top swimmers for Hauppauge were:

Avery Wilcox placed 2nd in the 200 and 500-yard freestyle.

Mary Schroeder placed 3rd in the 200-yard individual medley and 5th in the 100-yard breaststroke.

Hailey Wilcox placed 4th in the 100-yard freestyle, 5th in the 200-yard freestyle, and was part of the 1st place 400 freestyle relay.

Rowan Ashby placed 4th in the 500-yard freestyle relay.

Hauppauge-Smithtown finished with 396 points, Half Hollow Hills-Kings Park was 2nd with 283 points. They are now going to the Suffolk County Championship on November 4th to defend their County title. Great job girls!

On October 17th, Hauppauge High School hosted its Fall College Fair for students with 51 colleges in attendance.

The fair is offered in the fall and spring of each year and staff are invited to wear their college gear, whether it be from an alma mater or their favorite college, on those days.

"The fair is a unique opportunity for students to access over 50 colleges during the comfort of the school day. There are so many fairs that run at night in larger venues where students are waiting in lines to talk to these representatives," said Director of Guidance, Gary Campanelli. "Instead, by hosting it during the day, it allows only Hauppauge students to meet in a smaller, intimate setting with representatives who are usually the individuals reading college applications. The fair meets the needs of all levels, serving as a final push for our seniors to finalize college lists, but also as a starting point for many of our freshmen, sophomores and juniors to really start thinking about their post-secondary plans."

## HIGH SCHOOL FRENCH CLASSES HOST FRENCH STUDENTS FOR EXCHANGE PROGRAM


Several Hauppauge High School students in Christine Rigaud's French class had the unique opportunity to participate in a once-in-a-lifetime exchange program. While a group of students from Angers, France visited Long Island, staying with Hauppauge students for 10 days, their Hauppauge counterparts will be going to Angers in November to stay with the French students and their families.

Arriving on Oct. 9, the French students met their American hosts at Hauppauge High School before going home with their families for the first time. The following day, students were given a welcome breakfast and tour of the school where they followed their exchange partners, going to from class to class and after-school activities.



Throughout the week, the students were taught a lesson on Long Island geography and historical points before visiting Sagamore Hill National Historic Site, home to President Theodore Roosevelt, and the Montauk Point Lighthouse. The exchange students even got to experience an American homecoming football game on October 14th. During their remaining days exploring Long Island, the exchange students spent time with their host families, doing local activities such as Top Golf, bowling and even trekking into Manhattan for a Broadway show.

Their trip culminated with a few days in Manhattan, visiting Times Square, Grand Central Station, the Museum of Natural History, Chinatown, the Brooklyn Bridge, the Statue of Liberty, the 9/11 Memorial site, the Empire State Building and a tour of Columbia University.



#### French Exchange Students

On Nov. 4, Hauppauge High School students will visit the Lycée Mongazon school in Angers, France for the exchange. While there, they'll attend classes, participate in a walking tour and scavenger hunt with their exchange partners and visit several castles and cultural sites. Then, they will head to Paris where they'll visit the Louvre, Notre Dame, the Latin quarter, Shakespeare and Company, St. Germain, the Eiffel Tower, Les Champs-Elysées, L'Arc de Triomphe, travel the Seine River via boat cruise and more.

"When the students participate in an exchange program, the rewards are infinite," said French teacher Christine Rigaud. "Using the language in real-life situations, learning firsthand about the culture, traditions and food, speaking with the locals, visiting historic sights and learning about the history are just a few of the benefits."

Christine went on to say, "The students become more mature and self-confident as they navigate new situations. They learn to see things from a different perspective and become global citizens who are more understanding and accepting of cultural differences. Every time I travel with them, I get to see things through their eyes. It's an amazing experience."


