professional projects. He also said that he sees this program growing and is very excited for this new opportunity.

Dr. Robert Wankmuller spoke and thanked everyone for the new equipment they have. He said the tech teachers have put in a lot of time and energy in learning how to use this equipment. Our students are seeing now what they can do.
















These machines are used to route, carve, drill, and engrave wood, plastic, foam, aluminum, and other materials for a wide range of applications. In this case, the student is using the machine to carve out a scene and then inlay the pieces back into the wood to make a tabletop.





# HIGH SCHOOL GUIDANCE OFFICE IS PART OF "ACT TESTING TESTIMONIALS" FOR THE ACT WEBSITE

Hauppauge High School's Guidance Office was recently contacted by ACT (American College Test) to be a part of a testimonial in relation to ACT testing and District initiatives to provide students access to the exam. The ACT contains four multiple-choice tests; English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science, and an optional writing test. These tests are designed to measure skills that are most important for success in postsecondary education, and that are acquired in secondary education.

ACT contracted with "Pennylane Productions," a Hauppauge family-owned business, to film the testimonials which included two Hauppauge High School Seniors, Viraaj Hegde and Emma Walsh. Also filmed was our Guidance Director, Gary Campanelli, who was able to provide a valuable testimonial on what it means for our students to have access to take an in-school ACT test in their junior and senior years.

Ella Walsh is a Senior this year. When asked why she was happy to be able to take advantage of having an in-school ACT, Ella said, "I


