



TWO OF HAUPPAUGE HIGH SCHOOL'S TEACHERS TAKE FLIGHT WITH THE "CIVIL AIR PATROL" AND HS ALUMNI PILOT

On Friday, August 12th, Biology and Forensics teacher, Jeffrey Yablon and Technology teacher, Christopher Dowd took to the skies over Hauppauge on U.S. AIR FORCE-funded "Teached Orientation Program" (TOP) Flights made available through "Civil Air Patrol (CAP)," the USAF Auxiliary. Class of 2019 graduate, Alex Amirhamzeh, from Hauppauge flew the two educators who experienced the thrill of flight over Long Island for one hour each. The teachers swapped front and back seats in Westhampton Beach. They were presented certificates of completion. The flights are designed for STEM teachers and are meant to encourage teachers to instill an interest in aviation among their students.

After graduating from Hauppauge High School in 2019 as a CAP Cadet, Alex Amirhamzeh became an FAA-Rated private pilot in 2020, a commercial pilot in 2021, and a certified flight instructor (CFI) in 2022. Alex continues to serve in the USAF Auxiliary as an instructor pilot, orientation flight pilot, and transportation mission pilot, holding the grade of captain. Teacher Orientation flights are funded through CAP as part of the aerospace initiative that looks to allow STEM teachers to bring a thrilling flight experience over and around their high school into the classroom, in an effort to recruit future aerospace professionals.

Four of our high school students have received national recognition from "College Board." These students earned this recognition because of their academic achievements in school and outstanding performance on the PSAT/NMSQT®, PSAT™ 10, and/or AP® Exams. They've accomplished these milestones during an immensely demanding period of their high school career and they are four of the 62,000 students from across the country to earn academic honors from College Board's National Recognition Programs.

Students who may be eligible have a GPA of 3.5 or higher and have excelled on the PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10, or earned a score of 3 or higher on two or more AP Exams; and are African American or Black, Hispanic American or Latino, Indigenous, and/or attend school in a rural area or small town.


Danielle expressed the following sentiment recently, "We are so excited for the first annual backpack distribution and giving to those students in need. It's exactly what Rach would want."



Selling and moving from my home of fifty-one years in Hauppauge, is daunting. In "right sizing" I have to be selective in what to take, donate or discard. Frankly, it is hard to put my life into a box and watch it get carted away. That said, I decided to donate several HHS Yearbooks that have been in my personal library for years. I called Dr. Christopher Michael, Director of English Language Arts/Library, to ask if he would take the books. He agreed and we met at the familiar circular driveway in front of the HS building.

With him was Doreen Gordon, the Director of Social Studies and Business, a former student of mine in 1980! I became nostalgic and asked if I could see room 307 which had been, until my retirement in 2001, my classroom for most of the thirty years that I taught English and Public Speaking. Dr Michael graciously agreed.

Walking to the third floor, holding onto the banister, brought back memories of my running up these same stairs carrying a briefcase full of graded papers in one hand and a thermos of tea in the other. The building smelled the same yet it was quite different. New flooring with the school's logo at the entrance to





307 was delightful. But where were my wooden cabinets? A large black screen hung where my chalk board used to be. The window sills, bare of my plants, and the heating units appeared to be new. Freshly cleaned desks were angled in a semicircle. As much as I loved my "home away from home," this was no longer mine. I am grateful to have had a long and fulfilling teaching career. When it was time, I turned over my classroom keys, and passed the baton.

On this recent visit, I walked through the renovated library and recalled the card catalogs, the Guide to Periodicals, the small room with shelves of books reserved for the community to use on Thursday evenings. Hauppauge did not have its own established library until 2000.

Things sure have changed. The courtyard is nicely manicured with

shrubs and benches for students and staff. The handball courts are painted a bright blue. Very inviting indeed.

The theater holds a special place in my mind. I remember student-teacher talent shows, fundraisers for the Hauppauge Scholarship Fund, plays and concerts performed to full capacity appreciative audiences. Today's theater complex is impressive with new seats, improved acoustics and lighting systems. Yay, my taxes are being put to good use!

Ms. Gordon reminisced about her teachers. My colleagues flashed before me. We had fun times. We grew older together. Several have moved or passed away. Revisiting "my school" was a fitting farewell. I take fond memories with me and gladly leave behind yearbooks that will be archived in the HHS library.
