# EIGHTH-GRADE STUDENTS VISIT THE LONGHOUSE RESERVE FOR AN IMMERSIVE ART CLASS

Our eighth-grade students visited a wonderful and unique museum for an amazing experience on October 25th, with their Art teacher, Alicia Tully. The LongHouse Reserve, located in East Hampton, is an outdoor museum that has many permanent, as well as temporary, sculptural gardens, and works of art installations on their grounds.

LongHouse Reserve is a 16 acre integrated environment created by artist, collector, and world-renowned textile designer and weaver, Jack Lenor Larson (1927- 2020).

The sculptural garden features more than 60 outdoor works, including permanent collection works by Buckminster Fuller, Dale Chihuly, Yoko Ono, and Maren Hassinger, among others. These works and the setting encourage exploration and contemplation for visitors of all ages to see and think in new ways, and to incorporate art and design into their lives.

















