HAUPPAUGE WRESTLERS COMPETE AT "THE RICK HERMANN WRESTLING TOURNAMENT"

The Hauppauge wrestling team competed in the annual "Rick Hermann Wrestling Tournament" this past weekend. Hauppauge sent five wrestlers to the finals with freshman, Trevor Patrovich, 101 lbs, and senior, Charlie Olaechea, 160 lbs, winning their third tournament titles. Both wrestlers remain undefeated with Patrovich having a record of 13-0 with 11 pins and Olaechea with a 14-0 record with 9 pins and 4 technical falls. Olaechea, defeated John Glenn's, Anthony Bell by Technical fall. Bell is a returning Suffolk County D-2 Runner-up from last year.

Placing second for Hauppauge included eighth-grader Jacob Messina at 101 lbs. Messina has 8 wins with 7 by pin. Also placing second were Juniors, Jason Difrietus, 124 lbs, and Jackson Tacca, 145 lbs, while Gino Manta, placed third at 116 lbs, and Elijah Infante, 138 lbs, placing fourth. Eighth-grader Ryder Smith, 108 lbs, placed fifth. He currently has 11 wins with eight by pin.







Recently, the Hauppauge High School French students completed the second half of the exchange program. They spent eleven days in France, lived with French families, went to school, and had the opportunity to visit many sites. The last two days of the exchange program were spent in Paris.

In Angers, which is located in the Loire Valley, they lived with their French exchange partners and went to school at Lycée Privé Mongazon. One of our students even lived in the dorm at the school with his exchange student during the week. On the weekend, they went to his home in the country which is outside of Angers. The students attended classes, which are similar to college and block schedules. The French students go to school from 8 am - 5:45 pm on most days and have hour-long classes. Many of the students really enjoyed the longer lunch breaks and ate at cafés near the school with current and former exchange partners. After school and on the weekend, students went to a fair with their friends, explored the city, went shopping, visited castles and monuments, and enjoyed lots of great French food. Some of the students even visited Mont St. Michel in Normandy with their exchange families.



Near the end of our stay, we said our goodbyes and left for Paris. The students visited many sights including the Louvre, Notre Dame, L'Arc de Triomphe, les Champs-Elysées, Montmartre, Sacré Coeur among other things. One of our students even conquered his fear of heights and was able to enjoy the amazing view from the top of the Eiffel Tower!

When asked about the exchange, the students said:

"The trip to France was an amazing opportunity to see another culture and make new friends.

I had a great time learning and getting to try new things."

"The exchange gave us an opportunity to understand a way of life different from our own."

"It was a really fun experience."






BW STUDENT GOVERNMENT SPREADS HOLIDAY CHEER TO OUR VETERANS

The winner of the most colorful Gingerbread house is Adriana Caracappa


