### How has Hauppauge HS prepared you academically and personally for the future?

**Connor:** Hauppauge HS has a good variety of advanced classes to take for high achievers. Not only do I see the rigor as a benefit to my future as it allows me to expose myself to more advanced learning material that will become useful in my future studies, but also that I recognize the im-

portance of other skills such as time management, active participation and improved communication. I am fortunate to be part of a high school community with teachers, administrators, counselors and social workers that assist me in any way possible, especially in times of stress and difficulty.

**Kaitlin:** Hauppauge High School has prepared me for the future by offering a wide variety of classes and allowing me to follow my passions. Throughout my high school career I was able to take business electives, AP courses, IB courses, and college courses such as College Psychology. These classes not only challenged me academically, but would foster the growth of study habits and teach me time management. Music has always been a passion of mine, and although I chose to take these hard courses, I was able to be a part of the Chamber Choir from my sophomore to my senior year of high school. This taught me the importance of challenging myself, while still engaging in my interests.

#### What are your future plans?

**Connor:** As of right now, I am definitely planning on attending a 4-year college for undergraduate school and plan to major in either engineering or computer science. Not all of my college decisions have come out yet. I am leaning towards either MIT, Hofstra University, RPI or Stony Brook. In addition to undergraduate school, I will probably also seek a Master's Degree at a graduate school and then obtain a job in engineering or computer science from there.

**<u>Kaitlin:</u>** My future plan is to major in Industrial Engineering and receive my Masters in Business Administration. Additionally, I would like to travel the world and explore Europe.

#### What helped you focus on what you wanted to do in the future?

**Connor:** Upper levels of math and science, namely IB Math AA HL/AP Calculus BC, IB Physics HL and AP Computer Science Principles, motivated me greatly to pursue engineering and computer science. I have taken inspiration from my father, who is also an engineer and is the Assistant Vice President of Engineering, Construction and Central Utilities at Hofstra University. He has shown me important life skills and lessons about mechanics and also leadership and performing exceptionally well in school in order to create change in the world.

**Kaitlin:** My mindset and my determination to succeed drove me to achieve my personal goals for the future. High School, in my opinion, is about setting yourself up for success in college and as a person in the future. Anything is possible if you put your mind to it.

#### What is your favorite memory of Hauppauge HS or your previous time in elementary or middle school?

**Connor:** Much of my favorite memories during my time here as a Hauppauge student come from the nostalgia I had at Forest Brook Elementary School. One of my most vivid memories is carnival day occurring every year in elementary school in the middle of June. The best part about carnival day was all of those set-up inflatables to bounce on, slide on and climb on. Other fun attractions and activities during this day included signing classmates' shirts, air-powered teeball and magic shows. Overall, this was one of my favorite days at elementary school along with field day as not just because of all of the fun outdoor activities but also the sense of community that is seen with peers and teachers.

**<u>Kaitlin:</u>** It is hard to define one particular instance as my favorite memory. However, the memories that will define my high school experience are time spent with my friends.

#### Who do you admire at Hauppauge HS? Who has influenced you the most and how?

**Connor:** I will recognize a few names here at Hauppauge HS: Mr. Concannon for demonstrating an extraordinary amount of knowledge in mathematics as well as being polite and formal, Ms. Scanlon for teaching me English well and increasing my confidence in reading and writing, Mrs. Lasurdo for providing me a solid foundation for how to handle advanced classes by demonstrating important writing, studying and time management skills, Señora Sanchez for her sympathy in times of stress, Ms. Cascio for working with me to complete my work efficiently (and for being a little crazy sometimes), Mr. Morris for being the best social worker and helping me appreciate my times of enjoyment, and Mr. Lionetti for being a motivating swim coach to allow myself to put in my best effort. I would say they all impacted me in equally significant ways. I will not forget their compassionate actions for me.

**Kaitlin:** I admire my peers at Hauppauge HS. I have great admiration for the Class of 2023 who faced many challenges due to COVID-19. My peers in the IB cohort, specifically, have influenced me the most. Our time spent together in the IB course Theory of Knowledge, pushed us to express our own perspectives, broadening our worldly views and enhancing my ability to think critically.

#### How does it feel to be awarded this honor?

**Connor:** The feeling is absolutely incredible, most likely my proudest accomplishment here at Hauppauge HS. I experienced multiple times of struggle and immense anxiety because of my high workload; I was aiming for unrealistic perfectionism, receiving 100s on all of my assessments by giving more effort than was expected of me because I knew that every point counted. Despite the huge adversity, I now feel really glad that I am awarded this honor and hope to be an inspiration for my peers and new people that I meet as I leave high school.

**Kaitlin:** I am extremely proud to be awarded this honor. I have always taken pride in my academics and strived to do well in school. Overall, this achievement is the fruit of hard work and determination.

#### Do you have any advice to give to your underclassmen?

**Connor:** Many people tell underclassmen advice such as challenging themselves, participating in a wide array of extracurricular activities and community service, and, of course, avoid procrastination. While I believe that these are import-

**Kaitlin:** I have two pieces of advice to give my underclassmen. My first piece of advice is to follow your passions. Being happy when you walk into school, and focusing on your passions, whether it be theater, music, sports, mathematics, or debate, is the most important aspect in finding out who you are and who you want to be. Hauppauge offers a wide variety of classes and opportunities in order to support students in finding their interests. Take advantage of them. My second piece of advice I can offer to students is to manage their time. Time management is incredibly important. Although deadlines might seem to be far in the future, giving yourself the time to do the assignment, and do it well, will result in a lot less stress. Planning ahead and dedicating time to assignments, can help reduce your workload and allow you to have some free time.

#### What is one thing you would change about the world if you could?

**Connor:** In an ideal world, everyone should be compassionate and caring to each other. Every day, there are countless conflicts and stresses around the world that affect everyone: work, school, war, family obligations, violence, abuse, debate. If we acknowledge disagreements and respect each other's opinions, we could live in a world where compromise can be a solution to our everyday problems.

**Kaitlin:** One thing I would change about the world is to be more compassionate. People are eager to judge others and lack the understanding of where each person is coming from. The world is in need of more understanding. I believe that if we all take a moment to act kindly, and imagine ourselves in someone else's shoes, we can create a more empathetic world.

### If you could be someone else for a day, who would it be and why?

**Connor:** I would be my father for a day. I have such great admiration for him because of how much he cares for the family. From going to work on weekdays for 10 hours, to doing yard work on the weekends, to cook meals for the family and to provide our everyday needs, I am inspired by my father's resiliency, perseverance and work ethic in order to reach a high standard of living that I also want to have. I would also like to mention my mother for always caring for me every day and showing that any problem can be overcome through determination. Both of my parents shared their love with me to be successful, and I appreciate it very much.

**<u>Kaitlin:</u>** If I could be anyone else for a day, I would be Taylor Swift. I have always loved to sing and to play the guitar, and Taylor Swift has been my favorite artist since I was eight years old. Although I do not want to pursue music as a career, it is a passion of mine and being Taylor Swift for the day would be a dream come true.

**Connor:** As someone who is heavily involved in academics, I value my spare time greatly. **Kaitlin:** I have done various types of community service ranging from helping out at Red Cross Blood Drives to participating in the Lt. Michael P. Murphy Run Around the Lake fundraiser for our nation's veterans. However, my favorite community service I have performed was the High School's Reading and Math Summer Program. The program allowed me to have an impact on students' educational journeys and exemplified how we, even as High School students, have the power to help others.






