



















NEW TEACHER ORIENTATION AND ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL




HAUPPAUGE PREPARES FOR A GREAT SCHOOL YEAR DURING SUPERINTENDENT'S CONFERENCE DAY

Administrators, teachers, and staff members returned to Hauppauge School District on Wednesday, August 30th, for Superintendent's Conference Day. Led by Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Donald Murphy, district faculty and staff took part in a day of professional development, fellowship and preparation ahead of the district's first day of school, Sept. 5th.

Ms. Leanne Contino led Hauppauge High School's chamber choir who kicked off the conference by singing the National Anthem. Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum, Instruction, and Technology, Dr. Tim McCarthy, welcomed everyone back and thanked various members of the staff for their help in preparing for the conference, including custodians, maintenance, security, clerical staff, the IT department, STEAM teacher's assistants and the administrative team.

Deputy Superintendent Mr. Joseph Tasman highlighted all new administrators and new hires for the 2023/24 school year. He then recognized and congratulated those receiving tenure this year and those who held perfect at-



tendance during the 2022/23 school year. Dr. Murphy mentioned that last year he started the Superintendent's Eagle Award, recognizing colleagues who shine through acts of altruism, kindness, resilience, leadership, collegiality, kindness and compassion. Teachers, Dr. Donna Vogel and Amy Thompson, were the first two recipients of the award, and Dr. Murphy said that he will continue this endeavor more frequently throughout the new school year.

Staff members delivered inspiring keynote speeches, beginning with Hauppauge High School Assistant Principal, Andrea Darbee. Her speech, "The Simple Magic of Reading!," encouraged staffers to remember the joy and importance of reading. High School Assistant Principal, Joy Ferrara, took the stage afterward with her speech, "In the Arena: Showing Up and Being Seen," about the value of taking risks and being courageous in life as opposed to missing opportunities by sitting on the sidelines. Nurse and varsity cross-country and track and field coach, Mary Nowotarski, delivered her keynote, "Never Give Up on Them!," about the importance of believing in and supporting students. Hauppauge High School Principal, Joseph Wieckhorst, spoke about "Your 80-Year-Old Self" and the importance of reflecting on special moments in order to stay present.

Superintendent Dr. Murphy then introduced the district's new branding, including the district's motto, "Learners Today, Leaders Tomorrow." He presented the results of a summer survey which asked, "What makes Hauppauge special?" A resounding number of responses concluded that the dedicated staff, relationships, family atmosphere and community made Hauppauge a stand-out district.

The conference concluded with Dr. Murphy asking attendees the question, "What can I do as a superintendent so that you come to work every day excited, vested and feeling part of a team?" HAUPPAUGE SCHOOL DISTRICT HAS A NEW LOGO, AND A NEW EAGLE

You may have noticed some new changes to our District's branding. A great deal of work has taken place recently to update our branding materials to align with our new slogan "Learners Today, Leaders Tomorrow," which was approved by the Board of Education this past year. This effort was led by our Superintendent, Dr. Murphy. He said, "We believe this slogan best captures the notion that our students truly are the future leaders of this country and are destined to do great things. The Board also approved new Hauppauge logos symbolizing the history, culture and proud tradition of our district t their August 22nd meeting. You will begin to see our new "H" and "EAGLE" logos in publications, on social media, printed on clothing, and visible in our schools."



The logo and eagle were designed by Samantha Caylor who works in the Pupil Personnel Services office. Samantha has a background in graphic arts. She also has put together a Brand Book for the Hauppauge School District. The Brand Book is comprised of the primary logo to be used to represent us as a "united district of learners and leaders." Regarding our Eagle logo, "We are also all Eagles who love to show our pride in our home, school, and teams in ways big and small, on a wide array of materials, and for this we have our "Eagle Pride Logo."

Rebecca Bilski, Assistant Superintendent of Pupil Personnel Services, was part of the Brand committee and said, "One of the first things that struck me as we started our branding journey was the palpable sense of Pride that can be found in every building, classroom, office, and hallway throughout the District. It is more than pride - it's a feeling, and energy that connects everyone who calls Hauppauge home. It sets us apart from other places and is what makes our community truly special."

Ms. Bilski continued, "As we embarked on the branding journey, it became evident that our aim was not to just create a logo or a tagline; it was to capture and celebrate the unique identity that is Hauppauge. What emerged from this collaborative effort was a profound realization: Hauppauge is not just a school; it's a family. We share a collective sense of belonging and responsibility towards one another. 





"We're thrilled to celebrate our students and recognize them for the great work they've been doing. We're proud of their strong academic performance in the classroom and on College Board assessments like the PSAT/NMSQT®, PSAT™ 10, and AP® exams," said Joseph Wieckhorst, High School Principal. "There's so much that makes our students unique, and receiving this honor reinforces this as an asset for their future."

The criteria for eligible students include:

- GPA of 3.5 or higher.
- PSAT/NMSQT or PSAT 10 assessment scores that are within the top 10% of assessment takers in each state for each award program or earned a score of 3 or higher on 2 or more AP Exams in 9th and 10th grade.
- Attend school in a rural area or small town, or identify as African American/Black, Hispanic American/Latino, or Indigenous/Native.

"It's becoming increasingly hard for students to be 'seen' during the college recruitment process. We're exceptionally proud of the National Recognition Programs for celebrating students who are at times overlooked but have shown their outstanding academic abilities," said Tarlin Ray, senior vice president of BigFuture® at College Board. "This is a benefit not only for students but also for colleges committed to recruiting diverse and talented students."
