On Saturday January 27th, Hauppauge High School hosted the 2024 Eastern Long Island Division C Science Olympiad Regional Competition. Hauppauge had two teams compete amongst 60 total teams and they did a fantastic job! The teams earned 10 medals and our Team A earned 7th place overall, earning themselves an invitation to compete at the State Competition held in Syracuse on March 16th and 17th.




















MIDDLE SCHOOL SCIENCE FAIR


