
HAUPPAUGE WRESTLERS GO TO NYS WRESTLING CHAMPIONSHIPS

"Hauppauge qualified three wrestlers to the "NYS Wrestling Championships" held this past weekend. Juniors, Gino Manta and Connor Sheridan both claimed All-State Honors placing 7th and 8th respectively at 108 lbs. Gino ended the season with 34 individual victories and Connor had 31 wins. Senior Charlie Olaechea, 160 lbs. went 2-2 in the state tournament, falling one match shy of the blood round to place in the top eight. Olaechea finished the 2023-24 season with the most individual Hauppauge victories with 40 wins. In addition, Charlie reached the Suffolk County Wrestling Century Club of over 100 individual career victories, as well as passed the "Most Pins in a Hauppauge Single Season" with 27 pins this year.

Hauppauge placed 24th out of 132 teams entered. CONGRATS on a job well-done!

The profound sense of warmth and appreciation experienced by both educators and staff upon reuniting with former students are memories that will be cherished. The commitment for this academic





Bretton Woods - SEL Scavenger Hunt

















From the performance, middle schoolers got a first-hand look at what they can expect out of their high school arts experience.










VARSITY WINTER TRACK AND FIELD TEAM CONTINUES TO EXCEL



Superintendent of Schools Dr. Donald Murphy and Hauppauge High School Principal Joseph Wieckhorst have a shared goal to reach by June of 2024. They would like to get to know every high school senior in the Class of 2024, and in turn, have each senior get to know them.

As a result of the generosity of students, teachers, and families, the Bretton Woods Book Swap is ready to go! Many people took the time to sort through their home libraries and generously donated hundreds of beautiful books that are ready for new owners!

The Book Swap center will be located in the portable wing down the 3/4 hallway in the Indoor Playground. Books are arranged in 3 table groupings: K-1, 2-3, 4-5.

Teachers can sign up their classes to visit the Book Swap anytime it is convenient for them throughout the month of March. They will begin by giving students an opportunity to select up to 2 books each. Students are encouraged to select a few titles and "sample" each book to find 1-2 books that are "just right" for them using the tools given to them! (i.e. Five Finger Rule, P.I.C.K., etc.) These books are theirs to keep and do NOT need to be returned. If a student finishes a book and would like to bring it back to school to SWAP for another, they may do so.

Since many board books that would be appropriate for preschool children or younger were received, students with a non-school age sibling can select a book to give to a "Future BW Student!"










BRETTON WOODS FORENSICS CLUB WELCOMES GUEST SPEAKER

On Wednesday, February 28, 2024, Miss Capone, club advisor, and the students of the Bretton Woods Forensics Club had the great honor of sitting in on a presentation given by guest speaker, Mr. Joseph Giacalone. Mr. Giacalone is a retired New York Police Department Sergeant SDS (Supervisor Detective Squad) and an internationally recognized law enforcement expert. He has an extensive background in criminal investigations. Mr. Giacalone has held many prestigious positions in the N.Y.P.D. He was a highly decorated member of the N.Y.P.D. and the recipient of the N.Y.P.D. Medal of Valor. Mr. Giacalone has also served as an Adjunct Professor at John Jay College of Criminal Justice since 2005, where he teaches criminal investigation and other related topics.

Mr. Giacalone shared his expertise in forensic science with the students, discussing how he uses his investigative skills to solve cases. Students were given first-hand insight on the science of fingerprinting. In addition, Mr. Giacalone also introduced the stu-



dents to CODIS. CODIS is an acronym for Combined DNA Index System, a computer software system that operates local, state, and national databases of DNA profiles from convicted offenders, unsolved crime scene evidence, and missing persons. Students were able to ask questions and learn about what academic courses they should study in high school and college if they decide to pursue a career in forensics and criminalistics.

Miss Capone and the students were so appreciative to be given the opportunity to meet with Mr. Giacalone. Thank you Mr. Giacalone for your time, effort and expertise!

International recording artist and Emmy award winning composer Mark Wood, the original string master of the multiplatinum selling Trans-Siberian Orchestra and creator of the revolutionary Viper electric violin, is bringing his groundbreaking music education program "Electrify Your Strings!" (EYS) to the orchestra students of the Forest Brook Elementary School, Bretton Woods Elementary School, Pines Elementary School, Hauppauge Middle School and Hauppauge High School.

This exciting event will transform the student musicians into a full-fledged Rock Orchestra! Mark will perform with the students on his handcrafted 7-string fretted electric Viper violin as part of the 2023 - 2024 "Electrify Your Strings! Evolution Tour" on March 12, 2024 at the Hauppauge High School. The audience will be entertained by Mark's original material, as well as his exciting arrangements of music by Led Zeppelin, The Beatles, and more.

The program – now in its 24th year – is a music education experience like no other. Wood and his team work directly with a school's orchestra director to tailor-design a rock orchestra makeover complete with a public performance at the end of the experience. EYS builds on the strong foundation provided by the classically trained music teachers, creating a partnership that inspires students and boosts their self-esteem and motivation on stage and off. EYS has been featured on The Today Show, The CBS Evening News, and many more.

Mark Wood is the owner and operator of "Wood Violins," the premier manufacturer of electric orchestra string instruments worldwide. He studied under Maestro Leonard Bernstein, is a Juilliard-trained violinist, and Emmy-winning composer.
